

Nouns

Nouns are the **names** that we call places, people and things by. We can see, touch, taste, smell or hear most nouns.

Look at these **examples**:

School is a noun because it is the **name** of a place.

Boy is a noun because it is the **name** of a type of person.

Pencil is a noun because it is the **name** of a thing.

We can sense (see, touch, taste, smell or hear) nouns all around us. Look around where you are and write down the **names** of things that you can sense.

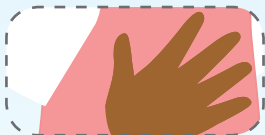
